- Population: 22,306,342 (July 2018 estimate)
- Median Age: 24.6 years
- Language(s): Spanish, Quechua, Aymara
- Government: Presidential Republic
- President: Evo Morales
- Independence Day: August 6, 1825
- Land Area: 424,164 square miles (slightly less than three times the size of Montana)
- Capital: La Paz (administrative capital); Sucre (constitutional capital)
- Agricultural Land: 34.3 % (2011 estimate)
- Forest: 52.5% (2011 estimate)
- Natural Resources: tin, natural gas, petroleum, zinc, tungsten, antimony, silver, iron, lead, gold, timber, hydropower
- Agricultural Products: soybeans, quinoa, Brazil nuts, sugar cane, coffee, corn, rice, potatoes, chia, coca
- Currency: 6.91 Bolivian Bolivianos = 1 US Dollar

- One of the world's largest butterfly sanctuaries covering about 60 acres
- Madidi National Park has an area of 7,181 square miles and is part of one of the largest protected areas in the world
- Lake Titicaca is the world's highest navigable lake at an altitude of 12,507 feet above sea level
- Bolivia contributes 70% of all the Brazil nuts produced worldwide
- · About half of the labor force is engaged in agriculture



Brazil

- Median Age: 32.6 years
- Language(s): Portuguese. North & South have difference accents
- Government: Federal Presidential Republic
- President: Jair M. Bolsonaro since January 1, 2019
- Independence Day: September 7, 1822
- Land Area: 3.288 million square miles, slightly smaller than United States
- · Capital: Brasilia
- Agricultural Land: 30.2% (2018 estimate)
- Forest: 66.3% (2018 estimate)
- Natural Resources: bauxite, gold, iron ore, manganese, nickel
- Agricultural Products: coffee, soybeans, wheat, rice, corn, sugarcane, cocoa, citrus, beef
- Currency: 3.75 Brazilian Reals = 1 US Dollar

- Largest country in South America
- Most of the Pantanal, the world's largest tropical wetland, extends through the west central part of the country

- Forest: 72,587 square miles of forestland, which constitutes almost 40% of the total land area
- Natural Resources: petroleum, bauxite, iron ore, timber, hydroelectric power, natural gas, cobalt, nickel, aluminum etc.

- First African country to enter the guarter-final of the FIFA World Cup (1990)
- Waza National Park is a very popular destination for tourism in Northern Cameroon
- Some of the most fertile land in the world
- Only bilingual country in Africa
- Cameroon was a German colony from 1884-1916 (was

called Kamerun)

Cameroon mountain is the highest in sub-Saharan Africa with an elevation of 13,250 feet

- Median Age: 37.7 years
- Language(s): Chinese (including Mandarin & Regional dialects)
- Government: Communist Party-led State
- President: Xi Jinping (since March 14, 2013)
- Independence Day: October 1, 1949
- Land Area: 3,706,581 square miles
- Capital: Beijing
- Agricultural Land: 54.7% (2011 estimate)
- Forest: 22.3% (2011 estimate)
- Natural Resources: coal, iron ore, petroleum, natural gas, tin, tungsten, antimony, manganese, molybdenum, aluminum, lead, zinc, hydropower

- Capital: Cairo
- Agricultural Land: 3.6% (2011 estimate)
- Forest: 0.1% (2011 estimate)
- Natural Resources: petroleum, natural gas, iron ore, phosphates, manganese, limestone, gypsum, talc, lead, zinc
- Agricultural Products: rice, corn, wheat, beans, fruits, vegetables, cattle, water buffalo, sheep, goats

- Prime Minister: Giuseppe Conte (since June 1, 2018)
- Independence Day: March 17, 1861; Liberation Day: April 25, 1945; Republic Day: June 2, 1946
- Land Area: 116,348 square miles (twice the size of Georgia)
- · Capital: Rome
- Agricultural Land: 42.7 % (2018 estimate)
- Forest: 34.7% (2005 estimate)
- Natural Resources: generally scarce, but active mines of iron, coal, oil, methane, bauxite, titanium, salt and marble
- Agricultural Products: fruits, vegetables, potatoes, sugar beets, soybeans, grain, olives, oil, beef, sheep, pork meat, horse meat, dairy products, fish, wine, liquors
- Currency: 0.88 Euro = 1 US Dollar

- Two of the world's smallest countries (San Marino and Vatican City) are surrounded by Italy
- Christopher Columbus and Amerigo Vespucci were explorers from Italy
- Italy has more masterpieces per square mile and world heritages than any other country in the world, many of them are in Rome, the capital founded in 753BC
- The oldest properly called university in the world, the University of Bologna, founded in 1088, is in Italy

- Prime Minister: Andrew Holness (since March 3, 2016)
- Independence Day: August 6, 1962
- Land Area: 4,244 square miles (about half the size of New Jersey; slightly smaller than Connecticut)
- Capital: Kingston
- Agricultural Land: 41.4% (2011 estimate)
- Forest: 31.1% (2011 estimate)
- Natural Resources: bauxite, gypsum, limestone
- Agricultural Products: sugarcane, bananas, coffee, citrus, yams, ackees, vegetables, poultry, goats, milk, shellfish


- Discovered by Christopher Columbus in 1494
- Jamaica is the first Caribbean country to gain independence and the third largest island in the Caribbean
- Jamaica is a "musical" country. One of the world's most influential musician is Jamaican reggae artist, Robert (Bob) Marley
- Jamaica was the first tropical country to participate in the Winter Olympics. They sent a bobsled team
- Jamaica was the first commercial producer of bananas in the western hemisphere. Jamaica produces Blue Mountain Coffee, one of the rarest coffees in the world
- Jamaica has the fastest people in the world! Jamaican
 Usain Bolt holds the world record in 100 and 200 meters

- Language(s): English and Kiswahili are official; numerous other languages.
- Government: Presidential Republic
- President: Uhuru Kenyatta (since April 9, 2012)
- Independence Day: December 12, 1963
- Land Area: 224,081 square miles (5 times the size of Ohio; more than twice the size of Nevada)
- · Capital: Nairobi
- Agricultural Land: 48.1% (2011 estimate)
- Forest: 6.1% (2011 estimate)
- Natural Resources: limestone, soda ash, salt, gemstones, fluorspar, zinc, gypsum, wildlife, hydropower
- Agricultural Products: tea, coffee, corn, wheat, sugarcane, fruit, vegetable, dairy products, beef, fish, pork, poultry, eggs
- Currency: 102.52 Kenyan Shillings = 1 US Dollar

- The Great Rift Valley is a stunning geographical phenomenon that cuts across Kenya from North to South
- Mt. Kenya is the 2nd highest mountain in Africa
- Swahili is a language that evolved from mixing Arabic with a class of languages called Bantu
- In Nairobi National Park, you can see lions, elephants, leopards, cheetahs, buffalos, zebras, giraffes, rhinos, etc. roaming freely
- Giraffe Manor is an upscale hotel where you can literally dine with real giraffes. The friendly giraffes interact with visitors and you can pet and feed them

- Independence Day: September 16, 1810
- Land Area: : 761,610 square miles (about one fourth of the contiguous United States)
- Capital: Mexico City
- Agricultural Land: 54.9% (2011 estimate)
- Forest: 33.3% (2011 estimate)
- Natural Resources: petroleum, silver, antimony, copper, gold, lead, zinc, natural gas, timber
- Agricultural Products: corn, wheat, soybeans, rice, beans, fruits and vegetables, cotton, coffee, beef, poultry, dairy products, wood products
- Currency: 20.24 Mexican Pesos = 1 US Dollar

- The U.S. Mexico border is the 2nd. largest in the World, only after the U.S. - Canada border
- Chichen Itza, once part of the Mayan Empire, is one of the seven wonders of the world
- A Mexican tamale called the Zacahuil is three feet long and weighs about 150 pounds
- The jaguar, the largest wildcat in North America, can be found in Mexico's southern jungles
- The first printing press in the Americas was used in Mexico City in 1539
- Millions of monarch butterflies from the United States and Canada migrate to Mexico each year
- The U.S. "cowboys" originated from the Mexican "vaqueros"
 from Northern Mexico

 8 major dialects.
- Government: Presidential Republic
- President: Rodrigo Duterte (since June 30, 2016)
- Independence Day: June 12, 1898 from Spain; July 4, 1946 from the United States
- Land Area: 115,831 square miles (slightly less than twice the size of Georgia; slightly larger than Arizona)
- · Capital: Manila
- Agricultural Land: 46.3% (2017 estimate)
- Forest: 28.9% (2015 estimate)
- Natural Resources: timber, petroleum, nickel, cobalt, silver, gold, salt, copper
- Agricultural Products: rice, fish, livestock, poultry, bananas, coconut/copra, corn, sugarcane, mangoes, pineapple, cassava
- Currency: 52.63 Philippine Pisos = 1 US Dollar


- There are approximately 7,641 islands and approximately 2,000 are inhabited
- There are 175 languages

- Natural Resources: hydropower, tin, phosphates, iron ore, coal, diamonds, gemstones, gold, natural gas, nickel
- Agricultural Products: coffee, sisal, tea, cotton, pyrethrum, cashew nuts, tobacco, corn, cloves, wheat, cassava (manioc tapioca), bananas, fruits, vegetables, cattle, sheep, goats
- Currency: 2,300 Tanzania Shillings = 1 US Dollar

- There are over 120 tribal languages
- Largest country in East Africa
- Tanzania is the home of three of the Seven Natural Wonders of Africa (Serengeti, Ngorongoro, and Kilimanjaro)
- Serengeti national park hosts the second largest terrestrial mammal migration in the world
- Tanzania's mpingo tree is one of the most expensive hardwood trees in the world
- Tanzania has the largest concentration of wildlife per square mile; more than 4 million wild animals and representation of 430 species and subspecies
- Tanzania is home to the coconut crab, the largest crab in the world
- Ngorongoro Crater is the world's largest volcanic crater with a diameter of 12 miles and a depth of 1,969 feet
- Tanzania is the home of Mount Kilimanjaro, the highest peak in Africa
- Lions in Tanzania can climb trees, which is not normal behavior

- Language(s): Thai
- Government: Constitutional Monarchy; interim militaryaffiliated government since May, 2014
- King: Wachiralongkon Bodinthrathepphayawarangkun (since December 1, 2016)
- Independence Day: 1238 (only southeastern Asian country never to be colonized by a European power)
- Land Area: 198,151 square miles
- · Capital: Bangkok
- Agricultural Land: 41.2% (2011 estimate)
- Forest: 37.2% (2011 estimate)
- Natural Resources: tin, rubber, natural gas, tungsten, timber, lead, fish, gypsum, lignite, fluorite
- Agricultural Products: rice, cassava (manioc, tapioca), rubber, corn, sugarcane, coconuts, palm oil, pineapple, livestock, fish products
- Currency: 32.77 Thai Baht = 1 US Dollar

- More than 1500 species of orchids grow wild in Thai forests
- Wildlife or native species: elephant (Thailand's national symbol) and tigers
- The monitor lizard can grow as long as seven feet and is native to Thailand
- Thailand is home to the reticulated python. The largest ever found was over 33 feet long
- The world's smallest mammal, The world's smallest mammal, the bumblebee bat (Craseonycteris

thaonlongyai), lives in Thailand Thailand's signature sport: Muay Thai (Thai boxing) is a native form of kickboxing, Sepak takraw (kick volleyball) Thai food: pad Thai, massaman murry, tom yum goong (spicy Thai soup with shrimp)
